

When I was a teenager, the priest I would go to for confession used to tell me, over and over: "In the end, we all get the same dirty hole in the ground."

What he meant was, it doesn't matter how rich or smart or well-liked we are. We're all heading to the same place. This life comes to an end for every man. All the money he earns, all the stuff, all the worldly esteem, will at some point be of no further use. We all get the same dirty hole in the ground.

It was an important message for me to hear, because at the time, it all seemed so important: my after-school job and my FAFSA application and my grades. The admiration of my friends and teachers. I was so consumed with what I was going to become that I wasn't spending a lot of time thinking about who I was going to become. But the who is the only thing that lasts until the next life.

And to be honest, it's all still too important to me. Avoiding sadness and disappointment. Saving money and being liked. Focusing on "the five-year plan" when it comes to career, house plans, and a whole bunch of other things I can't take to my dirty hole in the ground.

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

A major concern is the safety of our migrants. In light of this concern, I'd like to share with you the communication that all the parishes received from the Diocese. It reads... In accordance with our Diocesan commitment to ensure as much as possible the safety of our migrant brothers and sisters, the Office of Respect Life and Social Justice is collaborating with the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), local public safety authorities and active organizations. Our collaboration seeks to provide our Diocesan clergy and staff with as much clarity and resources as they are available. In an effort to be as prepared as we can to the possible presence of ICE agents in our Churches and Schools, we ask that you please refer and adhere to the guidelines provided from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. In essence, we have a right to ask for a warrant and federal agents have a right to arrest noncitizens who have a criminal record even if they don't have a warrant.....

Under the pastoral leadership of Most Rev. Bishop Barber, ... we will continue to work diligently in advocacy, safety protocols and resource offerings. We welcome your ideas, questions, and resources in this common effort to protect the most vulnerable among us. Thank you for all your already present offerings of solidarity and collaboration.

Obstructing or otherwise interfering with immigration enforcement is a crime, and anyone involved in such activities may be subject to prosecution under federal law. However, the Fourth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution still applies to immigration enforcement actions on most private property, meaning DHS officers and agents attempting enforcement in a private home or area require: (1) consent from an individual with authority over a place; (2) a judicial warrant (a warrant signed by a judge); or (3) the presence of exigent circumstances (similar to those listed above). Importantly, 1-9 site inspections at places of employment generally do not require an administrative or judicial warrant when three days notice is provided. Enforcement, or the threat of enforcement, on property owned by religious institutions may raise concerns under the First Amendment & Religion Clauses and the Religious Freedom Restoration Act.
